



#### PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATIVE UPDATES

HB 106—Patient Safety Act (MeHaffe—R). In a surprise session on Wednesday, June 28th, the Patient Safety Act which includes languages on nurse ratios in hospitals, passed out of the Appropriations Committee and the full House by a vote of 119-84. The Bill now moves to the Senate for review. Early implications were this Bill would not make it out of the House Committee. It is unclear what may happen when introduced in the Senate. There is opposition from hospitals and their administrators. Compliance to such a rule, if passed into law, will result in millions of dollars added to hospital costs. To learn more, click HERE.

Other Bills being monitored by ACS include:

HB 1492 – Cancer: Introduced by Representative
Robert Merski (D), HB 1492 seeks to provide
cancer screenings for firefighters. The bill was
introduced and referred to the House Veterans
Affairs and Emergency Preparedness
Committee.

HB 1493 – Cancer: Introduced by Representative La'tasha Mayes (D), HB 1493 requires health insurers to cover fertility preservation services without cost sharing requirements, while undergoing medication therapy, surgery, radiation, chemotherapy, or other medical treatment recognized by a medical professional to cause a risk of impairment to fertility, up to age 45. The bill was introduced and referred to the House Insurance Committee.

HB 1512 – Telemedicine: Introduced by Representative Christina Sappey (D), HB 1512 state a health insurer may not refuse to reimburse a participating provider or covered person for a medically necessary covered health care service provided through telemedicine;

reimbursement shall be in accordance with the terms and conditions of the contract; no requirement for payment parity. The bill was introduced and referred to the House Insurance Committee.

## IN THE NEWS—LEGISLATION

## American Medical Association (AMA) Launches #fixmedicarenow.org

The AMA announced their one-stop-shop for information and resources to address the critical issues physicians face due to the Medicare physician payment system. Physicians are the only healthcare professionals whose Medicare payments do not automatically receive an annual inflationary update resulting in a 26% lag behind the rate of inflation since 2001.

## Malpractice Lawsuits Over Denied Abortion Care May Be on the Horizon

The Kaiser Family Foundation (KFF), a non-profit, independent health policy research center, published an <u>opinion</u> piece by Diana Nordlund, MD, an emergency physician in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and former malpractice defense attorney, who concluded when physicians decide not to provide treatment widely regarded as the standard of care because of new laws it is perceived as substandard care and increases liability.

## Amazon Delays Launch of Telemedicine Service

<u>Politico</u> reports Amazon is delaying the launch of a major expansion of its Amazon Clinic telemedicine service due to legislator concerns regarding privacy of patient information. Currently, Amazon Clinic is available in 33 states and leans on asynchronous care, meaning patients fill out a

form to get treated for conditions like urinary tract infections, acid reflux and pink eye, as well as to receive emergency contraception and birth control.

Amazon claims, "Amazon Clinic has stringent customer privacy policies, and complies with HIPAA and all other applicable laws and regulations. We're focused on building products and services that our customers love, and we look forward to continuing to bring Amazon Clinic to even more customers to help address their everyday health care needs."

However, Senators Peter Welch (D-VT) and Elizabeth Warren (D-MA) raised concerns the company is "harvesting" health data from patients by requiring the patient to sign a release giving the company "complete" access to their health information. By signing the release, customers authorize Amazon to share their data, and acknowledge the information is not protected by HIPAA.

In a joint statement, the two senators said they hoped the delay "is a sign that Amazon has taken our concerns about data collection and use practices seriously."

Both original research and research presented at other meetings within the past 6 months may be submitted. Work that is currently under review or accepted for publication may be submitted. Electronically or physically published research is not eliqible for submission.

Submissions close on **Tuesday**, **August 1**, **at 12:00 pm CT**. Notification of acceptance will be sent in September.

- Complete the submission form and submit with your abstract or case study in a PDF file.
- 250-word count maximum for submissions. Submissions above this will not be considered.

 Previously presented abstracts will be accepted. Case Study Reports must be original.

## **Educational Outcomes:**

- Evaluate the quality of the research presented and offer actionable comments.
- Apply new information learned from the presentation to their own practice, if applicable.
- Utilize the session to form collaborations between institutions in the same geographic regions with the same interests.
- Top submission will present their research paper/case report prior to the keynote lecture on Monday, September 18<sup>th</sup>.
- All abstracts/case studies selected will present using a poster presentation format on <u>September</u> 18<sup>th</sup> from 5:30 PM to 6:45 PM. Abstract/case study submitters must be present during this time to be eligible for prizes.



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


