Meanderings from A Wandering Surgeon

Greetings friends and colleagues -

I hope you are well and safe.

This is not my initial planned submission for a newsletter update. After watching events unfold on January 6th, where I had the same scared, sinking feeling that I experienced on 9/11/2001 - not knowing what was happening, not understanding, with fear for peers, family, and many others I do not know - I cannot stop thinking that we are all culpable. For lack of respect. For bullying and harassment. For valuing opinion more than fact. For a culture that allows systemic suppression. For consuming more than our share. I ponder what I would do, how I would respond, the actions I would take when motivated by self-preservation, fear, hunger, homelessness, or the need to protect those or what I love. Without the empathy and ability to answer that question fully for myself, how can I even begin to understand and respond to the actions of others?

As surgeons, we represent a highly educated and empowered group. We are taught to speak for ourselves, to evaluate and defend the mistakes and misadventures we cause, to constantly learn and evolve — as science and the breadth of our profession evolves. If we do not evolve with it, we become lost and obsolete, without the tools required to flourish or care for our patients. The same is true for us as humans—if we do not evaluate and evolve, we too can become lost and obsolete. I am grateful for our life of vigorous standards but recognize that many are not equipped with such foundational tools of education, introspection, and

empowerment, let alone our "standard" living conditions.

For months we at the College and the Chapter have tried to emphasize open and healthy communication. With the Keystone Respite, we endeavored to create a "safe space" to speak and share. Please embark to create in all aspects of your life – personal or professional, public, or private – "safe spaces" to learn and grow and find the empathy we need to overcome these trying days. But remember, a safe space does not mean a free space – demand respect, consideration, and fairness, with fact prioritized over unsubstantiated claims or opinion – from yourself and others.

I ask each of you: Create a safe space. Remember that your words have meaning. Control and give shape to the words that stem from you. Be a source of truth and good, educate and uplift, give opportunity and inspiration. Prevent hurt and harm.

Your words have power, please choose them with care.

Fox Chase Cancer Center Revolutionizing Breast Cancer Surgery With SmartClip

Philadelphia is a city with world-class cancer care, thanks in part to the fact that more Philadelphia oncologists are implementing innovative technologies. Treatment options utilized benefit patients providing fewer incisions leading to more precise tumor extraction. With these advancements, patients have shorter hospital stays and recover quicker.

Philadelphia-based Fox Chase Cancer Center is now using a SmartClip Soft Tissue Marker which provides 3D, GPS-like navigation to help surgeons extract tumors with more precision.

As the article details, the benefits from using the SmartClip Soft Tissue Marker are the reasons Dr. Richard Bleicher, leader of the breast cancer program, began utilizing the device. The device localizes nonpalpable breast tumors with more accuracy and ease. Fox Chase has performed approximately 50 surgeries in the past four months and is currently the only cancer center in the Philadelphia region using the FDA-cleared device for assisting in breast tumor removal.

Most importantly, the seamlessness of utilizing the SmartClip Soft Tissue Marker can reduce patient stress.

As Dr. Bleicher explains, "When someone is diagnosed with breast cancer, it can be a very overwhelming experience. Our job is to alleviate that stress on the day of surgery, and this technology really helps us do that."

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in Surgery

The staggering COVID-19 infection and mortality rate in people and communities of color; continuing police violence against Black and brown Americans; improved but still meaningful gaps in pay, ratings, and considerations for women, minority, and LGBTQ+ surgeons—these issues and more led to an inflection point for the health care community in

2020. The need for improved diversity, equity, and inclusion in all facets of medicine has become more apparent than ever, including in the surgical community, and the ACS has dedicated itself to becoming a leader in this area.

To that end, much of the <u>January 2021 issue of</u> <u>the Bulletin of the American College of Surgeons</u> was dedicated to articles exploring this topic, and the <u>Bulletin Brief</u> will focus on these articles over the next several weeks.

The first highlighted article, "Diversity, equity, and inclusion: The House of Surgery needs work," serves as the introduction to the Resident and Associate Society of the ACS-themed issue, of which DEI was the selected topic. Burnout affects how engaged you feel with your patients, colleagues, and work. You may feel a lack of professional purpose. Feelings of being unempowered are common. You are not alone. The American College of Surgeons (ACS) is committed to fostering well-being, resilience, and work-life integration for surgeons at every stage of their careers. ACS is committed to developing and fostering well-being for surgeons.
