Metropolitan Philadelphia Chapter Annual Business Meeting Update

With restrictions in place that prevented an inperson annual joint meeting in May for Metropolitan Philadelphia Chapter members, the Council quickly made the decision to hold its Annual Business Meeting virtually providing members the ability to vote electronically on issues affecting the Chapter.

Two key issues were presented to the general membership for review, discussion, and voting:

- Proposed Amendments to the Chapter Bylaws that would realign the Chapter Council to provide additional leadership opportunities and reduce time commitments. The amendments also realigned the Bylaws to be consistent with ACS and other affiliated chapters.
- 2020-2021 Slate of Officers & Directors to install the new Council Officers and Directors.

Voting members were provided 45 days to review, ask questions and vote on the issues. Both issues were approved by the general voting membership. The newly revised Bylaws will be available on the MPACS website shortly, and we are pleased to introduce you to your 2020-2021 Officers who will assume their positions on July 1, 2020.

Economic Survival Strategies in the COVID World: A Guide from the ACS Practice Protection Committee

As part of the ACS' ongoing efforts to assist surgeons managing the intense financial burden placed upon them by the COVID-19 Pandemic, the ACS Practice Protection Committee has built upon the Practical Suggestions and Options to Consider section of its resource document to provide a guide to economic survival strategies.

The document can be found here and includes a set of key principles and a suggested process for Fellows to undertake based on an Excel spreadsheet exercise of personal and business finances. In addition, the Committee has provided suggestions to consider based on which of three specific scenarios you believe most accurately describes your financial situation.

ACS Provides Testimony on Trauma, Cancer, and Patient Identification Appropriations to Senate Subcommittee

ACS recently provided written testimony to the US Senate Subcommittee on Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies as the subcommittee plans for fiscal vear appropriations. The ACS' testimony outlined several appropriation-related priorities, including complete funding of \$11.5 million for the MISSION ZERO program, increased funding for cancer prevention and research, funding specifically for public health research into firearm morbidity and mortality, and removal of a ban that prevents the Department of Health and Human Services from evaluating a range of patient identification solutions.

ACS ANNOUNCES LAUNCH OF SURGICAL CARE COALITION

On June 18, 2020, the ACS announced the launch of the <u>Surgical Care Coalition</u>, a collaborative effort between the ACS and 11 other surgical associations.

Our health care system is under extraordinary pressure. The COVID-19 pandemic has created an uncertain financial future for surgeons—and this is before we factor in the Medicare payments cuts, planned before the pandemic, take effect in six months.

The Surgical Care Coalition message is simple: **Now** is not the time for payment cuts to any health care providers.

While the ACS has worked in concert with these other surgical groups in the past, the Coalition is now coming together as a unified force to address the pending CMS payment cuts. As a coalition, we are focused on getting Congress and the Administration to understand how these payment cuts will hurt patients and their care teams. These cuts threaten patients' access to timely surgical care and will impact the quality of life for the people we care for every day.

Delayed surgeries have negatively impacted hospital finances and surgeons' private practices—an important small business in many communities. ACS learned from you and more than 5,000 other surgeons that the pandemic and planned cuts could have serious consequences on your practices. Among the findings:

- 1 in 3 private practice surgeons are concerned they will have to shut down.
- 45% of surgeons have made a financial sacrifice by cutting their own pay or by paying employees despite falling revenues.

 35% of surgeons suffered negative financial consequences due to COVID-19 such as taking on debt and laying off or furloughing employees.

Right now, we are focused on putting these issues on the nation's agenda and stopping the payment cuts to surgeons. We are asking Congress to step in and ensure Medicare patients continue to have the best access—to the best care—when they need it and where they need it.

WONDERING WHAT'S HAPPENING IN THE PENNSYLVANIA LEGISLATURE?

The Pennsylvania legislature has focused much of their efforts on COVID-19 issues, but there have still been some significant bills introduced relating to healthcare. There are only a few days left before both the House and Senate recess for the summer and return in the fall for the final few weeks of the 2019-2020 legislative session.

Keystone and Metropolitan Philadelphia Chapters continue to monitor legislation and communicate with the ACS Government Relations team to determine if bills require action from the membership.

An overview of current bills being monitored will be emailed shortly to all members. A brief synopsis and a link to the Bill will be included.

We will continue to keep you apprised of changes with the current bills being discussed and when new legislation has been introduced that would affect your ability to practice and serve your patients.

MPACS COVID-19 TASK FORCE UPDATE

When the COVID-19 Pandemic hit the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and it affected the healthcare system in the Philadelphia region, surgeons felt the impact of this virus on their daily practice and life. As the local Philadelphia-based Chapter of the American College of Surgeons, MPACS formed an Ad-Hoc Task Force to reach out to our member surgeons and residents to address their professional concerns and questions.

The mission of the MPACS COVID-19 Task Force is to educate its members about the Pandemic, reiterate the American College of Surgeons guidelines and recommendations regarding safe practice and resuming surgeries, and to integrate these guidelines with local and state government recommendations.

The Task Force, comprised of members from a variety of local academic and community institutions, have met virtually over the past few weeks to shared different opinions and concerns and to bring relevant discussions to the table. In such a fluid changing environment, it is important to address professional, safety, and clinical concerns of our members and provide resources to help them navigate the unchartered waters we face.

The Task Force compiled a series of questions and sent a survey to our attending members to answer some of those concerns and to prioritize their most crucial concerns. A separate survey was sent specifically to our resident members to gain valuable insight into how this Pandemic has affected them and their educational concerns.

In the near future, a forum will be hosted by the Task Force featuring expert key opinion leaders in the field of medicine and surgery to address these critical concerns.

Your engagement with MPACS is important to highlight concerns in this evolving pandemic. Responses will help guide the Society to implement programs to serve you best.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION (CME) REMINDER FOR PENNYSLVANIA PHYSICIANS

Just a reminder – 2020 is a licensure renewal year and the clock is ticking.

The Pennsylvania Board of Medicine (PBM) and the Pennsylvania Board of Osteopathic Medicine (PBOM) require all licensees to earn 100 CME Credits every two-year renewal cycle. A minimum of 20 of the 100 CME must be Category 1 Credits, and both licensing boards require content-specific CME be included in this total.

PBOM licensees must renew by October 31, 2020 and PBM licensees must renew by December 31, 2020. The requirements are detailed below:

- 100 Credit hours every two-years: A minimum of 20 hours must be AMA PRA Category 1 Credits™ (PBM) or AOA Category 1-A Credits (PBOM).
- Credit hours addressing Pain Management/Addiction/Prescribing: ΑII prescribers or dispensers must complete at least two hours of continuing education in pain management, the identification of addiction or in the practices of prescribing or dispensing of opioids. This continuing education must be in AMA Category 1 or 2 approved activities for the PBM and may be in either AOA Category 1 or 2 approved activities or AMA Category 1 or 2 approved activities to meet the PBOM requirement.
- 2 Board-approved credit hours addressing Child Abuse Recognition/Reporting: Two hours of Board-approved continuing education in child abuse recognition and reporting requirements must be completed for renewal or reactivation of a license.

12 Credit hours addressing Patient Safety/Risk
Management: At least 12 of the 100 hours must
be completed in activities related to patient
safety or risk management and may be
completed in either AMA Category 1 or 2
activities. This requirement is exclusive to the
Pennsylvania Board of Medicine.
